





Total private employment Over-the-month change, 2008-10












B-19. Employment in government Over-the-month change, 2008-10

Seasonally adjusted, in thousands



B-21. Index of local government employment from beginning of recession, seasonally adjusted




Civilian unemployment rate 1990-2010


Civilian labor force and unemployment levels, 2007-2010

Employment-population ratio 1990-2010



U.S. Inflation, 2000-2010





Total employment changes in expanding and contracting industries,


3-month change, seasonally adjusted, in thousands 1990-2010

Private nonfarm payrolls vs. industrial production Over-the-quarter change, 2000-10





Private nonfarm payrolls vs. equipment and software investment



Temp help services and private nonfarm employment, 2000-10





Manufacturing employment Over-the-month change, 2008-10



Manufacturing employment 1939-2010












Unemployment rates for persons 25 years and older by educational attainment 1992-2010

Unemployment rates for whites, blacks or African Americans, and persons of Hispanic or Latino ethnicity 1990-2010



Alternative measures of labor underutilization 1994-2010



Seasonally adjusted, percent








Percentage change in total private employment, from private nonfarm peak, seasonally adjusted


Percentage change in total private employment, from NBER designated trough, seasonally adjusted


Peak-to-trough employment decline, by downturn

Share of total private employment losses by firm size, this downturn vs. 2001 downturn




